Key Points to Discuss in Letters of Support:

- Discrepancies between advertised and delivered internet services
- Economic impact for individual resident or business (e.g. working from home, providing WiFi as a service to customers)
- Impact of internet service on property value and saleability
- Impact of internet service on quality of life
- Educational opportunities and/or advancement

Specific points to focus on relating to lack of adequate Internet service, speed or reliability (any quantification or detailed anecdotes are especially useful)

- Realtor # of lost sales at least partially due to Internet issues; any instance of work-at-home; any instances of seasonal rental properties having occupancy problems
- Business specific problems with access by customers, e-tail, accessing vendors, tracking shipments, inability to support property security technology
- Seasonal resident inability to access Internet for entertainment, YouTube or similar video material; keeping up with work and maintaining other critical communications contacts
- Resident problems with working-at-home entertainment, shopping, general information access, education activities, bill payment, job searching, contacts with family and friends with Skype, FaceTime, etc.; accessing medical or doctor appointment information, accessing government agencies, banking, social media, viewing YouTube or other similar video material, inability to support home security technology
