ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The University of WI Oshkosh has been offering discounted well water quality testing through this program since 2019. The goal of this program is to provide education about the importance of testing your well water as well as build a database of groundwater quality data in Door County.

HOW IT WORKS

- Receive sampling kit in mail
- Attend a virtual forum to learn how to sample
- Return your kit April 11th & 12th at designated drop-off locations
- Receive your results & countywide summary of study

These 4 year old, 3 foot, bare root seedlings are \$6.50 each but are available only as bundles of 25. Trees should be available in mid to late April.



The History of Clark Lake Buoys By Gwenn Graboyes

Perhaps many of you, like me, thought we have had buoys on Clark Lake "forever". In fact, the first buoys were placed just 17 years ago, in early 2008. It was a motley crew of Paul Schumacher, Bob DeFaut, and Marc DeGroot, with occasional other volunteers. The anchors to the first buoys were sunk in the winter, after cutting holes in the ice at the prescribed GPS coordinates. There are now 11 buoys, 4 in the North End, five in the East Bay, and two marking 200-feet distance from shore at the West and East boat ramps.

We have two types of buoys on our lake – regulatory buoys which require a town ordinance to be enacted and informational buoys (DNR approval only). Boaters who fail to comply with the regulatory buoys can be ticketed and fined. In early 2008 both Jacksonport and Sevastopol townships enacted essentially identical ordinances to mark the SLOW NO WAKE areas in the two sections of East Bay where DNR sensitive areas and bulrushes exist. Both townships needed to pass the ordinances as these protected areas lie within the jurisdiction of both townships. In December 2008, the Town of Jacksonport passed the NO MOTOR ordinance for North Bay, where aquatic vegetation and fish spawning areas needed protection from motor boat destruction of the shallow bottom at the egress of Logan Creek into Clark Lake. Since instituting the NO MOTOR zone at the north end, there has been a significant 40-50% improvement in turbidity, i.e. less turbidity. In addition, we have the two informational buoys marking the 200-ft distance from the shoreline at the West and East boat ramps.

He has worked for the town of Baileys Harbor since 2017 in multiple different roles, including most recently as Wastewater Operator, and now in Public Works and the Marina.



Noisy January Nights

Winter residents on Clark Lake experienced a mild January on the lake this year. Days were much warmer than what is typical for winter days in Door County. Snowstorms and the Arctic cold really did not arrive until February. Very often Clark Lake can become a loud wind tunnel during winter storms. It was different this year during January.

Days were warmer than what is typical for winter days in Door County. Nights were below freezing so there was this constant expansion and contraction of the ice on the lake. As a result, ice groans seemed louder and more frequent this year than other years in the past. On still nights the shifting ice could be heard almost constantly...even inside the house.

Why does this happen? As ice expands and contracts, the ice begins to crack and becomes deformed. This movement creates vibrations that are carried across the surface of the frozen lake. Sound is amplified like on the surface of a drum. Because of frequencies of how sound travels, the shifting ice can almost sound like a cracking whip. Snow depth on the frozen lake can also absorb sound. These vibrating sounds create an interesting phenomenon on any frozen lake. Clark Lake is no exception.

The Great 1928 Valmy Fire



One hundred years ago, back in March, 1925, Valmy was a sleepy little burg near Donlon's Swamp on Highway 78, now known as Highway 57. The Door County Advocate described the town to be "so small that when driving through you would be out of it before you were in it!" Back then homes there were owned by Emil Leist and George Voeks. The Barker Lumber and Fuel company branch was located there, and on the corner sat the Traveler's Inn, a hotel and general store owned by Joe Petersilka. Feldhofer Brothers Garage, the Fred Suckey hardware building, and Wagner blacksmith shop made up the rest of the buildings. The homes of Frank and Ed Felhofer were farther up the hill towards Whitefish Bay. It was a busy center with a character all its own...the days when "oxen held sway."

The Great 1928 Valmy Fire Continued...

Everything changed in Valmy almost 100 years ago. Back in April, 1928, almost all wooden structures in the town were destroyed by a growing wind-fueled fire. An explosion of an oil stove occurred in the living quarters of the Fred Suckey Hardware store. Cartridges exploded in the store and fired off a volley of shots. A gas pump in front of the store ignited. Gusty winds caused the fire to spread. The Sturgeon Bay Fire Department was called to help save the town, but by the time they arrived, the highly combustible wood structures were all ablaze. Winds and lack of water caused the burning buildings to crumble. This Valmy fire, witnessed by over 1000 people, was one of the worst fire in Door County. Total loss estimates at the time were \$50,000 which equates to over \$750,000 today. Virtually nothing was saved. Only a couple of structures from that monster fire stand today.

Residents rebuilt parts of Valmy over the years, but unfortunately they have endured other fires in the area since 1928. Today Valmy remains a "go-to" destination for Clark Lake residents in need of gas, groceries, or drinks at the "Happy Hour."
